

NEW iPHONE RINGS UP A BIG PREMIUM

All iPhone 14 Pro series devices reserved or sold in 45 minutes at Dubai Mall branch

Resellers are looking to cash in on the iPhone 14 craze — with some units being sold on classifieds websites for a whooping Dh10,500, just hours after the series' release in the UAE.

One seller has posted a gold iPhone 14 Pro Max 1 TB for this price on the popular platform Dubizzle. It retails at only Dh6,799 on the official Apple website.

A brand-new iPhone14 Pro Max 256GB — originally priced at Dh5,099 — was also being resold for Dh6,500. Advertised as "Bought directly from Apple Store, with receipt and full warranty", the phone is purportedly available only for "today".

Since the first ad popped up, at least three dozen more have been placed on Dubizzle for various iterations of the phone.

Currently, all iPhone 14 Pro and Pro

Max phones at The Dubai Mall branch of Apple have either been sold or reserved. One resident bought as many as 10 devices for his whole family, and it wasn't even the first time he made such a purchase. Osama Azhar said his family would usually upgrade their phones every year and, this time, they splurged on brand-new iPhones.

Abdul Rafeeque, an IT manager at a media company, was the first person to buy the brand-new device after securing a reservation for 8am.

What resellers say

A reseller who did not wish to be identified said that he had posted his device for a premium of Dh1,000 and had received a lot of interest. "Some people just want to get their hands on the item first, so they are ready to pay whatever premium is required," he said. "I have received a lot of calls. I am now waiting to finalise the deal with whoever is ready to pay me first."

Another one said that he had already sold his but refused to disclose how much he had sold it for. "The buyer was eager to get his hands on the product," he said. "So, he met me as soon as I posted and bought it from me." the had sold it for. "The buyer was eager to get his hands on the product," he said.

Earlier on Friday, hundreds of people

stood in queues for over four hours at the flagship store to get their hands on the newly launched iPhone 14 and its iterations. Dr Mohannad, who arrived with a bag of cash, went to the mall as early as 4 am and was waiting to buy four devices for himself and his family.

The UAE is among the first countries where the US technology major has rolled out its latest smartphones that were unveiled on September 7. Apple has priced iPhone 14 at Dh3,399; iPhone 14 Plus at Dh3,799; iPhone 14 Pro at Dh4,299; and iPhone 14 ProMax at Dh4,699 in the UAE.

Salik ups IPO size to 24.9% on demand



ubai's road-toll operator Salik on Friday announced that it has increased the number of shares offered in its IPO from 1.5 billion ordinary shares to 1.86 billion (1,867,500,000). This move — which comes as a response

to strong investor demand — increases the IPO size from 20 to 24.9 per cent of Salik's share capital, with the Government of Dubai continuing to own 75.1 per cent.

Salik has also received an approval from the Securities and Commodities Authority to allocate the increase to respective tranches. The first and third tranches (in aggregate) will increase from 120 million to 145 million (145,725,000) ordinary shares.

The second tranche (for qualified inves-

tors) will increase from 1.38 billion to 1.72 billion (1,721,775,000) ordinary shares.

The larger IPO size follows Salik's decision to set the offer price at Dh2 per share on September 13.

This provides investors with a highly attractive value proposition, and also reflects Salik's prioritisation of supporting aftermarket trading performance, post-listing.

The subscription period for the Salik IPO remains unchanged — it will close on September 20 for individuals and September 21 for qualified investors.

Investors who participated in the UAE retail offer will be notified of their allocation of shares via SMS on September 26. — WAM

Hundreds of bodies found in mass grave, says Ukraine



Ukrainian officials said they had found a mass burial site with hundreds of bodies in territory recaptured from Russian forces, in what President Volodymyr Zelensky called proof of war crimes by the enemies.

Zelensky said many Ukrainians were also buried in other sites in the northeast and appealed for foreign powers to step up weapons supplies, saying the outcome of the war hinged on their swift delivery.

"As of today, there are 450 dead people, buried. But there are others, separate burials of many people. Tortured people. Entire families in certain territories," Zelensky said in his presidential office on Friday.

The head of the pro-Russian administration which abandoned the area last week dismissed the accounts of the burials outside the city of Izium and accused Ukrainians of stagemanaging atrocities.

"I have not heard anything about burials in Izium," Vitaly Ganchev told Rossiya-24 state television.

Outside the city on Friday, men in white overalls were digging out bodies at the site in a forest where around 200 makeshift wooden crosses were scattered among trees. Some 20 white body bags could be seen.

NOW IS NOT A TIME FOR WAR, MODI TELLS PUTIN

Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi told Russian President Vladimir Putin on Friday that now was "not a time for war" on the sidelines of a regional summit in Samarkand, Uzbekistan. New Delhi and Moscow have longstanding ties dating back to the Cold War, and Russia remains by far India's biggest arms supplier. But in their first face-to-face meeting since Moscow's forces attacked Ukraine in February, Modi told Putin: "Excellency, I know today's time is not a time for war."

India has shied away from explicitly condemning Russia for the attack, which sent the price of oil and other commodities soaring. But he stressed the importance of "democracy and diplomacy and dialogue" in the meeting on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation summit. They would discuss "how to move forward on the path of peace", Modi added. The comments from the Indian leader came just a day after Putin acknowledged that China – Russia's key ally – had "concerns" over the conflict in Ukraine. – AFP

Beckham lines up overnight as wait to view queen's coffin hits 24 hours

The tens of thousands of people queuing to file past the coffin of Queen Elizabeth were warned on Friday that it would now take up to 24 hours to reach the building, and that temperatures overnight were expected to be cold.

People of all ages and from all walks of life have paid their respects to the late queen, joining a well-organised line that stretches along the south bank of the Thames then over the river to parliament's Westminster Hall.

Such has been the demand that by mid-morning organisers decid-



ed the line was too long and urged people to stay away — a testimony to the respect and affection for the queen, who died in Scotland at the age of 96 after a 70-year reign

Despite the warning – repeated

across local rail stations — people continued to flood into Southwark Park to join the back of the queue, many in high spirits.

Former England football captain **David Beckham** said it was "very emotional" to pay his last respects to Queen Elizabeth on Friday after he queued for hours through the night. "We're all there to say thanks to Her Majesty for being kind, for being caring, for being reassuring throughout the years," he said. — REUTERS





Appleheads in the UAE rushed to buy the latest iPhone14 and its variations as the devices hit the shelves on Friday.

One guy, Osama Azhar, went all out and bought 10 phones

"My whole family, we are loyal fans of Apple," said Azhar, who was among the hundreds who went to the Apple store at The Dubai Mall during the launch.

"We find iPhones very easy to use compared to all the other phones," he added.

The Dubai resident said his family buys new phones every year and, this time, they decided to splurge on iPhone 14.

Despite his big order, he didn't encounter any glitch with Apple's reservation system, he said.

"As soon as the process began, I signed up for the devices. It was fairly easy and straightforward, and I was

Dubai AG appeals ruling refusing Shah's extradition

The Attorney-General of Dubai, Essam Issa Al Humaidan, has appealed a court ruling that refused Denmark's request to extradite Sanjay Shah, a British national wanted by Danish authorities for alleged tax fraud and money laundering.

The Dubai Police had earlier arrested Sanjay Shah following Denmark's extradition request. Al Humaidan then referred the request to the Dubai Courts.

When the case reached the Dubai Court of Appeal, a decision was issued refusing the request. The latest appeal will be heard in the Dubai Court of Cassation.

Sanjay Shah is the alleged mastermind behind a scam known as 'cum-ex trading'. He had been wanted in Denmark for the past seven years, Khaleej Times reported previously.

Shah's fraud scheme involved submitting thousands of applications to the Danish Treasury on behalf of investors and companies from several countries around the world in order to receive dividend tax refunds,' the Dubai Police earlier said in a statement.

The alleged scam, which ran for three years since 2012, has been described as one of the largest fraud cases in Denmark's history.

Abdul Rafeeque, an IT manager at a media company was the first customer to buy the device after securing a reservation for 8am.

"I bought six iPhone 14 Pro 256GB," said the beaming Indian expat. "I had reservations for two iPhones in the morning and four for the evening. But when I asked the staff if I could pick up everything now, they agreed." He said he was buying multiple devices for his friends and family.

"Although I have been at every launch event since the [iPhone] 4S, this is the first time that I am first in line," he said. He shared images of launch events he had attended in the past.

Rafeeque had logged on to several devices to secure the earliest appointment when the reservations started.

Some people had been waiting since 4am to get into the mall, despite having reservations. Dr Mohanad was one of them, buying four devices. "I came at 4am and waited until the mall opened at 7am," he said. "I am buying three iPhone Pro Max and one iPhone Pro for myself and my family."

The Dubai resident had arrived with a bagful of cash for his purchase. "I wanted to pay in cash," he said. "So I brought enough with me."

The businessman will be replacing his iPhone X that he has had for the last five years. "I think I will give the old phone to my younger brother," he said.

Another man shopping for his younger brother was Kaja Mohamed. He bought two iPhone 14 Pro Max's and two Series 8 Apple Watches.

"I am going to India today and I wanted to buy my brother a gift," he said. "So, I de-

cided to get a new phone and watch for him and myself."

All iPhone 14 Pro and iPhone 14 Pro Max devices at The Dubai Mall store were either reserved or sold just 45 minutes after sales began. Those wishing to buy the new phone can expect to wait several weeks or choose to buy from resellers at a premium.

Apple has priced iPhone 14 at Dh3,399, iPhone 14 Plus at Dh3,799, iPhone 14 Pro at Dh4,299 and iPhone 14 ProMax at Dh4,699 in the UAE.

Resident told to pay Dh25k for defrauding pupil's father

An Abu Dhabi resident, who took Dh25,000 from a man after promising to obtain a scholarship for his daughter to study at a university in the UAE for free, which never happened, has been ordered to pay back the man's money.

The Abu Dhabi Court of Appeal for Family and Civil Administrative Claims overturned an earlier ruling by the Court of First Instance which had dismissed the lawsuit filed by the father.

The father had accused the defendant of defrauding him and taking Dh25,420 from him after promising to provide a scholarship for his daughter at a university in the country

In his lawsuit, the father had requested the court to oblige the man pay back his cash in addition to another Dh25,000 in material and moral damages.

He said that the defendant deceived him by saying that he would obtain a scholarship for his daughter in a university in the UAE. The father said the man had asked him for Dh25,420 claiming that it was the fee for applying for the scholarship and that his daughter will study for free. He later realised that it was a scam as the defendant didn't obtain the scholarship for his daughter despite taking the money. The court of first instance had earlier dismissed the case on grounds that the father didn't present sufficient evidence to prove that the man took money. The father went to the appeal court which cancelled the first verdict and instead ordered the defendant to pay back the cash he took from the father after he was found guilty of defrauding him and taking his cash on false pretences. The father had presented WhatsApp messages they exchanged with the defendant where it clearly showed that he handed the cash to the defendant to obtain for him a university scholarship for his daughter.

Physical bank cards long way from being obsolete: Expert

hysical bank and identity cards, using microchip technology, are a long way from becoming obsolete, a top expert in the payment card manufacturing sector has said.

Physical bank cards, including debit, pre-paid, and credit pavment cards – in some rare cases, identity cards are also used as payment.

Despite the boom in mobile banking, digital payments, and wearable technology in the UAE, physical cards will continue to remain an essential tool for payment of goods and services, Michael Hraschan, the director of product management payment at Toppan Gravity, told *Khaleej* Times.

He was speaking on the sidelines of the Khaleej Times DigiBank 2022 – a banking transformation forum that took place recently.

Toppan Gravity is a global solutions provider primarily focused on the payment and identity industries. Hraschan said: "People would use physical cards for the foreseeable future as a safety measure, and as a back-up, in case they lose the device they are using for their banking purposes.

"People like the safety of knowing they have a physical copy of a bank card with them, especially when travelling," he stated.

"Moreover, we are trying to optimise card production and issuance process and set up kiosks where providers can print cards on the spot."

Hrashcan also suggested that bank cards are a lifestyle or status symbol in some cases. "Having a premium metal card from a certain bank, for example, is a status symbol for many people," he stated. Moreover, Hraschan said providers could customise cards even for Gen Z users that live and breathe mobile technology. "They would also usher in the era of wearing wearables," he stated.

Last year, Mastercard announced that from 2024, its credit and debit cards will not be required to have a strip 'in most markets and will be completely phased out by 2033. It claims to be the first payment network to ditch the magnetic strip. 86 per cent of card transactions globally rely on chip technology, Mastercard said.

Companies such as Toppan Gravity have also said it manufactures sustainable business and eco-friendly cards at their production unit in Sharjah.

The Ajman Criminal Court sentenced a 51-year-old man to 11 years in prison followed by deportation, for sexually assaulting a 5-year-old girl in his car. The convict lured the little girl and her brother near her residence in Ajman to his vehicle. Once inside, he began indulging in indecent acts with the girl and also filming the acts. The mother of the two kids told Public Prosecution investigators that when she came looking for her kids, some people informed her that the children were inside a stranger's car. the man told them that he would take them for a ride in his car, and he put the 8-year-old boy in the front seat and the 5-yearold girl in the back seat. He then asked her to remove her undergarments and began filming her with his phone and sexually harassing her. After the man was arrested, he was found to be wanted for 37 criminal counts of sexual harassment, indecent assault, public indecency, and theft. The man had been deported before, but had returned to the country. The police found pictures of six naked children in the deleted folder on his mobile phone. —AFKAR ALI AHMED

Man stabs relative to death

Murder A man has been referred to a psychiatric hospital after killing his relative.According to files from the Ajman Criminal Court, the 26-year-old Asian, identified as RAM, stabbed his relative in front of several witnesses in a room they shared. One witness said the incident happened after Friday prayers, when he and another witness were in the room with the accused and the victim. He and the victim were preparing lunch when a fourth person entered the room to ask them for help moving some items from the apartment into a car. The victim then asked the accused to go and help

When the victim entered the room, he attacked the man with a vegetable knife, stabbing him in the chest. Dr Haider Ali, consultant family medicine at Medcare Medical Centre, lists out the measures that helped the UAE deal with the pandemic. "Availability of mass testing, contact tracing via MoHaP, strict measures of mask wearing, which continues, closing down the borders, and setting up field hospitals are some of the factors that helped the UAE bring down its number of Covid cases," he said.

"The UAE's efforts in safeguarding our population were evident in how we reached 5th worldwide and 1st in the Arab world in terms of testing which has no doubt had a significant role in bringing numbers down.

Should sponsors provide health insurance to dependents and domestic workers?

The Dubai Health Authority (DHA) on Friday clarified the insurance requirements that the emirate's residents must fulfil, particularly if they are sponsoring a number of dependents.

These dependents may include, spouses, children, parents, as well as household workers, nannies and drivers.

As part of its #BeInformed campaign, the authority on Friday

sponsors provide health insurance to their dependents and domestic workers?

Here's what the DHA said:

All residents in the UAE - both Emiratis and expats - are mandated to have medical insurance coverage.

While nationals will be able to have access to a government-funded insurance programme, expats have to be given one by their sponsors.

"The extent of coverage for em-

responded to a question: Should ployers and their dependents is determined by the employee's salary, designation etc," according to the UAE Government's official website.

There could be slight differences in implementation from one emirate to another.

In Abu Dhabi, employers and sponsors should provide coverage for their employees and their families (one spouse and three children under 18 years), according to the government site.

In Dubai, a minimum standard specifically about insurance.

of coverage has been established by the DHA for all employers, as well as residents who are sponsoring their families and household workers.

The DHA encourages employers to provide medical insurance for the spouse or dependents of its employees.

However, if an employer does not provide this coverage for its staff's family members, then the sponsor will need to arrange cover for them, the authority said on its website





Egypt orders release of 46 detainees in latest pardons

Rights lawyer freed

Egyptian authorities announced on Thursday the release of 46 detainees, including a prominent human rights lawyer. Tarik El Awady, a member of Egypt's presidential pardon committee, confirmed the release of the lawyer, Haitham Mohamadein, and the other 45 detainees, all of whom are awaiting trial. Several pictures of the freed lawyer alongside friends and family were later shared by activists on social media. It remained unclear if other detainees had walked free yet. In April, Egypt released more than three dozen detainees before the end of the holy month of Ramadan, typically a time when prisoners are released on presidential pardons. — AP



Bloc of Arab parties splits ahead of **Israeli elections**

5th polls in 4 years

A bloc of Arab parties has split ahead of Israel's fifth elections in less than four years, a move that could dilute the minority's political influence and aid former Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's return to power. Israeli media reported late Thursday that the nationalist Balad party will run separately from the other two parties in the Joint List. If it does not meet the minimum threshold, Balad would not enter the next parliament and its votes would essentially be wasted. The disunity could also dampen overall turnout among Israel's Arab minority. Arab parties have helped block Netanyahu from returning to power in recent elections. A fourth Arab party, the Islamist Ra'am, also broke from the Joint List and made history last year by joining the governing coalition, a first for any Arab faction. — AP

Iran's President Ebrahim Raisi has ordered a probe in the case of a young woman who slipped into a comma while in custody in Tehran and died, state media reported on Friday. The police have said she suffered a heart attack. Raisi asked Interior Minister Ahmad Vahidi to "investigate the cause of the incident with urgency and special attention". According to reports on social media, Mahsa Amini, 22, was detained earlier this week by the so-called "morality police" after officers apparently found fault with her headscarf, or hijab. Police said on Thursday that Amini was taken to a hospital after she allegedly had a heart attack while in custody. Pro-reform news websites quoted an uncle of Amini as saying she had no history of heart disease. Police said she was arrested on Tuesday.—AP

The man walked away with about \$19,000 in cash but turned himself in to police moments later as a crowd formed in front of the bank to support him.

A few hours later in the Beirut neighbourhood of Tariq al-Jdideh, a tense security situation developed around a branch of Blom Bank, although details were unclear.

Witnesses outside the bank said an indebted shop-owner had demanded access to his trapped savings.

He was locked inside the bank together with police officers, the witnesses told the news agency at the scene, but was thought to be

Another man armed with a hunting rifle stormed a bank in Beirut's Ramlet el-Baida neighbourhood on Friday, witnesses told an AFP photographer at the scene. The spate of heists comes two days after a young activist stormed a central Beirut bank with fuel and plastic gun to demand the deposits of her sister, who needed to pay for cancer treatment.

The woman identified as Sali Hafiz made off with around \$13,000 and became an instant hero on social media with a picture of her standing on a desk inside the bank during the raid going viral on social media.

"She had every right to do this. would do the same if I was as brave as her," said Carla Chehab, a 28-year-old Beirut resident.

"And don't let anyone call her a

bank robber. The thieves are the banks, the government and all rich people protecting them," she added.

Also on Wednesday, a man held up a bank in the city of Aley northeast of Beirut, the official National News Agency reported.

The raids are seen as mostly acts of desperation by Lebanese depositors who do not have criminal records and are trying to settle bills, drawing broad support from the general public.

Last month, a man drew widespread sympathy after he stormed a Beirut bank with a rifle and held employees and customers hostage for hours, to demand some of his \$200,000 in frozen savings to pay hospital bills for his sick father.

He was detained but swiftly released and was present Friday outside the bank in Tariq al-Jdideh to express his support. Lebanon has been battered by one of its worst-ever economic crises.

Its currency has lost more than 90 percent of its value on the black market, while poverty and unemployment have soared.

Banks have been widely accused of operating like a cartel and of spiriting large amounts out of the country for senior Lebanese officials at a time when foreign transfers were already blocked for ordinary citizens.

The country's main depositors' association voiced its support for desperate bank clients.

We call on every depositor who refuses injustice, oppression and theft to support any depositor who asks for what is rightfully theirs," association member Tala Khalil said. — AFP

Pope Francis is studying a possible visit to Bahrain in November and said on Thursday he is looking to reschedule his trip to South Sudan and Congo for February. But the 85-yearold pontiff said he would undertake a next trip - a reference to a three-day visit to Bahrain in early November that is currently under study by the Vatican, spokesman Matteo Bruni said. Francis had to cancel a planned July trip to South Sudan and Congo after his doctors said he needed more time to undergo therapy on his right knee. Francis has been using a wheelchair and cane for months since he strained the ligaments, and he was in visible pain during the three-day trip to Kazakhstan.—AP

BREAKOUT MOMENT

Federer first arrived on the Grand Slam scene as a 16-year-old when he won both the boy's singles and doubles titles at Wimbledon in 1998. His volatile temperament got in his way at the start of his run as a senior pro on the ATP circuit. The maturing of his talent began in 2001 when he won the Hopman Cup, a mixed gender team event, representing Switzerland along with Martina Hingis, who was the world No.1 in women's tennis at the time.

Unlike others of the era coached in their formative years in academies in the US and Spain, Federer learnt tennis in a club in his home town of Basel. An Australian ATP tour player, Peter Carter, who coached at the club, moulded his precocious talent. But he was naive in tactics and self-control until his stint at the Hopman Cup tournament in 2001 with Hingis, whom Federer later credited for helping him become "the player I am today

DOMINANT PERIOD The breakthrough came on his favourite surface at Wim-

bledon in 2003 when he beat Roddick in the semi-final and big-serving Australian Mark Philippoussis in the final.

With his first Grand Slam trophy in the bag, Federer rapidly climbed up the ranks to end the year narrowly behind Roddick at No.2. It was a precursor to the most dominating period of his career. He was the holder of three Grand Slam titles in a calendar year thrice in 2004, 2006, and 2007. Each time, the clay of the French Open stopped him from

getting the calendar Grand Slam, which no man has done since Rod Laver in 1969. Brazilian baseline specialist and three-time French Open champion Gustavo Kuerten, who had an unusual backhand grip for topspin from both flanks, stopped him in 2004. Thereafter, he lost to Nadal four times in a row in the 2005 semi-finals and three consecutive finals from 2006.

It reprised Björn Borg's feat from an earlier era of winning back-to-back Grand Slams four times consecutively on different surfaces when the Swede lifted the French Open and Wimbledon trophies from 1978 to 1981.

BIGTHREERIVALRY

In the six-year period between 2009 and 2015, Federer won four Grand Slam titles, including two at Wimbledon, one in Australia, and one at the French Open. It was Djokovic's turn to dominate the circuit, while Nadal continued to rule the roost in Paris. But the Swiss star was still always a contender in the last stages of any Grand Slam event.

It was at the start of 2016 in his mid-thirties that he began to deal with a knee injury that would eventually end his career. He had the first of his three surgeries that year, which was the first time since 2004 that he dropped out of the top 10 in the ATP men's singles ranking. Many felt the great man should bow out gracefully

rather than continue to play below par, hampered by injury. But Federer wasn't done. He had parted ways with coach Stefan Edberg, but had taken to heart the suggestions of the Swedish serve-and-volley specialist who twice beat Boris Becker in Wimbledon finals.

Longevity in a sport is a mark of greatness as much as tal-ent and tactics, fitness and strength. Unlike Borg and Sampras who quit early in their careers, no longer willing to suffer the grind and pressure of the tour, the Big Three took the Shakespearean option "to take arms against a sea of troubles, and by opposing, end them".

Federer's swan song came in the 2019 Wimbledon fi-nal against Djokovic. He had two match points on his own service but couldn't convert either of them. He finally lost 13-12 in the final set tiebreaker. It was a remarkable final in which Djokovic won three sets in tiebreakers.

Compounding the heartbreak was a recurrence of the knee problem, which forced Federer to have another surgery and go into a long hiatus. He made an attempt to come back one more time, playing a few tournaments before entering Wimbledon in 2021. He got through to the quarterfinals but lost in straight sets to Hubert Hurkacz of Poland.

A third knee surgery followed, and despite working hard to make a final stand, he had to give in. "I am 41 years old. I have played more than 1,500 matches over 24 years. Tennis has treated me more generously than I ever would have dreamt, and now I must recognise when it is time to end my competitive career," he said in a farewell note on Twitter.

Warming, other factors worsen Pak floods: Study

Human-caused climate change also plays a key role in the disaster, says climate scientist

limate change likely juiced rainfall by up to 50 per cent late last month in two southern Pakistan provinces, but global warming wasn't the biggest cause of the country's catastrophic flooding that has killed more than 1,500 people, a new scientific analysis finds.

Pakistan's overall vulnerability, including people living in harm's way, is the chief factor in the disaster that at one point submerged one-third of the country under water, but human-caused "climate change also plays a really important role here," said study senior author Friederike Otto, a climate scientist at Imperial College of London.

There are many ingredients to the still ongoing humanitarian crisis - some meteorological, some economic, some societal, some historic and construction oriented. Add to that weather records that don't go back far enough in time.

With such complications and limitations, the team of international scientists looking at the disaster couldn't quantify how much climate change had increased the likelihood and frequency of the flooding, said authors of the study. It was released on Thursday but not yet peer reviewed.

What happened "would have been a disastrously high rainfall event without climate change, but it's worse because of climate change," Otto said. "And especially in this highly vulnerable region, small changes matter a lot."

But other human factors that put people in harm's way and weren't adequate to control the water were even bigger influences. "This disaster was the result of vulnerability that was constructed over many, many years," said study team member Ayesha Siddiqi of the University of Cambridge.

August rainfall in the Sindh and Balochistan provinces - together nearly the size of Spain - was eight and nearly seven times normal amounts, while the country as a whole had three-and-a-half times its normal rainfall, according to the report by World Weather Attribution, a collection of mostly volunteer scientists from around the world who do realtime studies of extreme weather to look for the fingerprints of cliin the intensity of rainfall that was likely due to climate change. They also looked at the entire Indus region over two months and saw up to a 30 per cent increase in rainfall there.

The scientists not only examined records of past rains, which only go back to 1961, but they used computer simulations to compare what happened last month to what would have happened in a world without heattrapping gases from the burning of coal, oil and natural gas - and that difference is what they could attribute to climate change. This is a scientifically valid technique, according to the US National Academy of Sciences.

Study co-author Fahad Saeed, a climate scientist at Climate Analytics and the Centre for Climate Change and Sustainable Development in Islamabad, Pakistan, said numerous factors made this monsoon season much wetter than normal, including a La Nina, the natural cooling of part of the Pacific that alters weather worldwide.

Pakistan raises issue of wanted man in Afghanistan

FO clarifies

Pakistan on Thursday said that it has formally raised the issue of the presence of a UNdesignated terrorist in Afghanistan with the Afghan officials, a day after the Taliban government firmly rejected reports about the presence of Jaish-e-Mohammed (JeM) chief Masood Azhar in the war-torn country. Foreign Office spokesperson Asim Iftikhar Ahmed said this at a weekly briefing after he was asked about reports that Azhar was in Afghanistan but an Afghan spokesperson officially denied it. "The person is a proclaimed offender and wanted in numerous terrorism-related cases in Pakistan," he said, adding that Pakistani authorities have formally raised the issue of the presence of the UN-designated individual with the relevant Afghan interlocutors on multiple occasions. - PTI

Children, women suffer from water-borne diseases

Children and women are becoming more vulnerable as tens of thousands of people suffer from infectious and water-borne diseases in flood-hit Pakistan, government data showed and Unicef said on Friday, as the total death toll from the inundation surpassed 1,500.

As flood waters begin to drain away, which officials say may take two to six months in different areas, the flooded regions have become infested with diseases including malaria, dengue fever, diarrhoea and skin problems, the Sindh provincial government said in a report issued on Friday.

It said more than 90,000 people were treated on Thursday alone in the province, which has been the hardest hit by the cataclysmic floods. The report confirmed 588 malaria cases with another 10,604 suspected cases, in addition to the 17,977 diarrhoea and 20,064 skin disease

cases reported on Thursday. A total of 2.3 million patients have been treated since July 1 in the field and mobile hospitals set up in the flooded region.

Hundreds of thousands of people who have been displaced are in dire need of support in term of food, shelter, clean drinking water, toilets, and medicines. Many have been sleeping in the open by the side of elevated highways.

"I have been in flood-affected areas for the past two days. The situation for families is beyond bleak, and the stories I heard paint a desperate picture," said Abdullah Fadil, Unicef Representative in Pakistan.

"All of us on the ground see malnourished children battling diarrhoea and malaria, dengue fever, and many with painful skin conditions," he said in a statement. He said a lot of the mothers were anaemic and malnourished themselves, and with very lowweight babies, being exhausted or ill and unable to breastfeed.

Millions of families are now living with little more than rags to protect themselves from the scorching sun as temperatures in some areas pass 40 degrees Celsius, Fadil said. - REUTERS

Six members of minority family killed by Taliban: Amnesty

Hazara community

A leading international rights group released a report on Friday about six members of an extended minority family in Afghanistan who were brutally killed by the Taliban earlier this summer. It accused Afghanistan's new rulers of blatant disregard of human rights and abuse of minorities. Amnesty International said the slain Hazaras included a 12-year-old child in what the rights group said was a deliberate attack on the ethnic minority. The killings took place in Ghor province on June 26. According to Amnesty, Taliban forces raided the home of Mohamad Muradi, a Hazara and a former security official in Ghor. Muradi had also led a local militia that fought the Taliban in 2020 and 2021.—AP

SCO leaders back PM's call for climate change plan

The presidents of Uzbekistan, Tajikistan, Iran, and Mongolia on Friday seconded the proposal of Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif for an action plan by the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) for Pakistan to overcome the impact of climate change.

Sharif in his address at the Heads of State meeting of SCO in Samarkand, Uzbekistan, had drawn the attention of the member states to the disaster Pakistan was facing as a result of climate change despite the country's less than one per cent contribution to carbon emissions.

of Uzbekistan President Shavkat Mirziyoyev stressed that the proposal of Prime Minister Sharif needed to be taken up at the level of the organisation.

Mirziyoyev, who hosted the SCO summit, urged the member states to help Pakistan overcome the catastrophic damage caused

by flash floods. Tajikistan President Emomali Rahmon, Iranian President Ebrahim Raisi, and President of Mongolia Ukhnaagiin Khurelsukh also fully endorsed the suggestion made by Prime Minister Sharif.

In his address, Prime Minister Sharif called upon the member states of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) to come up with Pakistan-specific programmes on climate change as the country faced the devastating impact of the global natural phenomenon.

'This climatic injustice has befallen us despite the fact that our carbon emission is less than one per cent," the prime minister said.

The prime minister's call to the SCO members came in the wake of the recent flash floods in Pakistan that wreaked havoc with the livelihood and infrastructure across the country.

He mentioned that Pakistan was braving the disaster of floods, where hill torrents and massive rains killed more than 1,400 people including 400 children, while millions of houses were damaged partially or completely.

"I earnestly appeal to all of you that let the SCO stand up and take steps against this devastation through sustainable programmes," he said.

Sharif said the country never faced such level of climate-induced catastrophe in its history that inflicted disaster upon human lives, infrastructure, livestock, and crops.

A wall collapsed on a slum dwelling made of polyethylene sheets and mud early on Friday in the Hazratganj area of the state capital where labourers were sleeping. Nine died on the spot and another three were hospitalised with injuries, Pathak said. In Unnao, a town 40km southwest of Lucknow, another three people were killed in a house collapse following torrential rains, Pathak said.

Earlier this month, life was dis-

eavy rains flooded rupted in the southern Indian city hundreds of homes, of Bengaluru after two days of torrential rains set off long traffic snarls, widespread power cuts and heavy floods that swept into homes and submerged roads.

People hopped onto tractors to get to work. Boats were deployed to rescue people submerged in floodwaters in Bengaluru, the capital of Karnataka state. The two zones that make up the city, Bengaluru Urban and Bengaluru Rural, saw 141 per cent and 114 per cent excess rainfall, making it the wettest September day in the past eight years.

Monsoon rains in South Asia typically begin in June. But this year, heavy downpours lashed northeastern India and Bangladesh beginning in March, triggering floods as early as April in Bangladesh.

The monsoon season that ends in October leaves hundreds of people dead and tens of thousands homeless every year. The weather

Mourners brave 24-hour wait in chilly London to see the queen's coffin

The entry to an already mileslong queue to see Queen Elizabeth lying in state in London resumed after a pause on Friday, with the government saying the current wait-time is over 24 hours, in temperatures set to plummet to 7 degrees Celsius.

Elizabeth died in Scotland aged 96 last week, prompting an outpouring of emotion that drew tens of thousands out to see her coffin on its journey to London, and that has now led many more to join the long line to pay their final respects during a four-day lying-in-state ceremony.

"Expected queuing time is over 24 hours and overnight temperatures will be cold," Britain's culture department warned on Twitter at 1614 GMT, having paused the entry to the queue around 0900 GMT when it reached a designated end-point in Southwark Park.

But people still waited. Neither the hours-long wait nor the weather deterred mourners, who were pouring in from both within the country and across the world to pay their respects to Britain's longest reining monarch.

Reuben Ferrier, an accountant from London who was in the line, spoke of the queen's "stoicism, her deep commitment to the country, a remarkable life". "I think this is the least I can do."

The constantly-moving queue is snaking its way from Southwark Park to parliament's Westminster Hall, where the queen's coffin is lying in state. Some 750,000 people in total are expected to file past before Monday's funeral.

"I've no sensation in my knees

at all or my legs," said Hyacinth Appah, a mourner from London in the queue. "But it's been fine. Most of the people have been lovely and we've had quite a nice time." Temporary toilets have been installed along the route of the queue, and mourners have been asked not to bring camping equipment, sleeping bags or folding chairs.

"She was everything. She was here the whole of my life. You couldn't ask for a more regal, dignified person. She represents a country — she is the country," said Susan Green, a retired NHS worker.

Former England soccer captain David Beckham and New Zealand Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern were also spotted paying their respects to the queen. — REUTERS

BBC: China banned from viewing Queen lying-in-state

The Chinese delegation visiting London to attend Queen Elizabeth's funeral on Monday will not be allowed to view her coffin at the lying-in-state vigil inside parliament, the BBC reported on Friday. Some parliamentarians had raised concerns about inviting representatives from China after several British lawmakers were sanctioned by Beijing for criticising alleged human rights abuses in Xinjiang.

The BBC said that it understood the Chinese government delegation had been banned after the speaker of the lower house of parliament had refused access to Westminster Hall on the parliamentary estate due to the Chinese sanctions. — REUTERS

Two London police officers were hospitalised after being stabbed in the city's busy West End on Friday, the Metropolitan Police force said. The attack is not being treated as terrorism. The force said officers patrolling near Leicester Square encountered a man with a knife earlv Friday morning and were stabbed while trying to detain him. The officers – a man and a woman – were taken to hospital with injuries that are not life-threatening. A man believed to be in his 20s was arrested on suspicion of grievous bodily harm and assaulting an emergency worker.—AP

Flights cancelled as French air traffic controllers on strike

80x travellers affected

Airlines cancelled half of flights scheduled for Paris on Friday and many others that would have flown over France, as a strike by air traffic controllers imposed the latest round of disruption on European travel. "It is inexplicable that thousands of European citizens/visitors will have their travel plans unfairly disrupted by yet another French ATC (air traffic control) strike," Ryanair said in a statement. The travel plans of 80,000 passengers had been affected when it had cancelled 420 flights, mainly intended to fly over France, the airline added. Strikes and staff shortages in the past few months have forced airlines to cancel thousands of flights, with disruption continuing into the autumn. Air France said on Wednesday due to the then impending strike it would operate only 45 per cent of its short and medium-range flights and 90 per cent of its long-haul flights. — REuters

Xi, Putin look to challenge world order at SCO summit

ussian President Vladimir Putin and Chinese leader Xi Jinping looked to rally Asian leaders behind a new "international order" as they met on Friday for a summit aimed at challenging Western influence.

But cracks in summit solidarity quickly appeared, with India's prime minister telling Putin it was "not the time" for the conflict in Ukraine and the forces of two countries — Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan — engaged in fierce border clashes while their leaders were in attendance.

The meeting of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) in ex-Soviet Uzbekistan brought Putin and Xi together with the leaders of SCO members India, Pakistan, and four Central Asian nations, as well as the presidents of Iran and Turkey.

Putin and Xi met on Thurs-

day for their first face-to-face talks since Russia sent troops into Ukraine in February, and on the Chinese leader's first trip abroad since the early days of the coronavirus pandemic.

The summit was put forward by the Kremlin as an alternative to "Western-centric organisations", at a time of increasing pressure on Moscow over Ukraine and growing anger in Beijing over US support for Taiwan.

Xi told the gathered leaders it was time to reshape the international system and "abandon zero-sum games and bloc politics".

They should "work together to promote the development of the international order in a more just and rational direction", Xi told a joint session.

Putin hailed the increasing influence of countries outside the West, slamming what he called "instruments of protectionism, illegal sanctions and economic selfishness".

"The growing role of new centres of power who cooperate with each other... is becoming more and more clear," Putin said.

The summit has been Putin's first major international outing since Moscow sent troops into Ukraine in February, sparking a conflict that has left thousands dead and seen Russia hit with waves of economic sanctions.

All did not go perfectly for the Russian leader.

In their talks, Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi told Putin: "Excellency, I know today's time is not a time for war." Putin told Modi he knew of India's "concerns" about the conflict, echoing language he had used with Xi the day before.

"We will do our best to end this as soon as possible," Putin said, while accusing Kyiv of rejecting negotiations and wanting to achieve its goals "on the battlefield".

The SCO — which also includes Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan — was set up in 2001 as a political, economic and security organisation to rival Western institutions. The group is far from fully united. The leaders of the Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan were forced to meet at the summit to order their forces to withdraw after deadly clashes along their disputed border raised fears of all-out conflict.

Some 19,000 people had to be evacuated on the Kyrgyz side of the border and sporadic clashes were continuing despite the ceasefire order.

Putin and Xi both also met with Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan, who told the assembled leaders that efforts were being made "to finalise the conflict in Ukraine through diplomacy as soon as possible".

Putin told Erdogan, who has been a key broker in limited deals between Russia and Ukraine, that Moscow was keen to build closer ties with Turkey and was ready to "significantly increase" all exports to the country.

For Putin, the summit was a chance to show that he is not fully isolated on the global scene, at a time when his forces in Ukraine are facing major battlefield setbacks.

For Xi, it was an opportunity to shore up his credentials as a global statesman ahead of a pivotal congress of the ruling Communist Party in October, where he is widely expected to secure an unprecedented third term as president. — AFP

Hundreds of bodies found in mass grave, says Ukraine

"We are at the site of the mass burial of people, civilians who were buried here, and now according to our information they all have the signs of violent death," Kharkiv Governor Oleh Synehubov said at the site.

"There are bodies with hands tied behind (their backs). Each fact will be investigated and will be properly and legally evaluated," Synehubov said.

If the numbers of bodies are confirmed, the site in Izium, a former Russian frontline stronghold, would be the biggest mass burial found in Europe since the aftermath of the 1990s Balkan wars. Russian President Vladimir Putin did not immediately respond to the accusations. Ukrainian officials say 9,000sqkm have been retaken, about the size of the island of Cyprus.

But Putin defended his operations in Ukraine, saying on Friday he had sent his troops into Ukraine to prevent Western plans to break up Russia.

Speaking at a summit of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation, and discussing the war publicly for the first time since Ukraine routed Russian troops in the Kharkiv region last week, Putin threatened strikes on Ukrainian infrastructure, and said: "We will see how (Ukraine's counteroffensive) ends."

Russia regularly denies targeting civilians during what it calls its "special military operation" in Ukraine and has said in the past that accusations of human rights abuses are a smear campaign.

In Kupiansk, a northeastern railway junction city whose partial capture by Kyiv's forces on Saturday cut Russia's supply lines and led to the swift collapse at the front, small units of Ukrainian troops were securing a nearly deserted ghost town.

Pound plummets to 37-year low on anniversary of Black Wednesday

terling marked the 30th anniversary of "Black Wednesday" by falling to a fresh 37-year low against the U.S. dollar on Friday, and a 19-month trough against the euro, after weakerthan-expected retail sales figures reinforced fears about Britain's economy.

The pound fell more than 1 per cent against the dollar to \$1.1351, its lowest since 1985, and was last trading at \$1.1404.

Most major currencies have been struggling against the dollar in recent months, and the greenback was given another leg-up this week after hotter-than-expected U.S. inflation caused markets to price in a further large rate hike from the Federal Reserve next week.

The pound has particularly struggled, however, and the euro rose to as high as 87.71 pence on Friday, its highest level since Feb 2021. It was last up 0.39 per cent at 87.45 pence.

On Sept. 16 1992, Britain crashed out of the Exchange Rate Mechanism — a system designed to reduce currency fluctuations ahead of the launch of the euro – causing a sharp devaluation in the pound.

That day, now known as Black Wednesday, saw sterling fall 4.3 per cent to finish the day at \$1.778, well above today's level.

Friday's drop followed data that showed retail sales volumes slipped 1.6 per cent in monthly terms in August — the biggest fall

Short-dated German bond yields rose to 11-year highs on Friday as European Central Bank (ECB) policymakers emphasised that tackling rising prices was their priority and August inflation in the bloc was revised upwards.

On Friday, traders continued raising those bets and priced in 70 bps of hikes in both October and December, and peak rates at around 2.6 per cent in mid-2023.

Data showing euro zone inflation rose 0.6 per cent in August from July, compared with an estimate of 0.5 per cent, also put upward pressure on bond yields.

Focus was also on money markets. While the bloc's overnight rate, ESTR has risen in line with the ECB's 75-bps hike, rates on German repurchase agreements, where investors borrow bonds in return for cash, have only risen around 55 bps, according to Commerzbank data.

That means the ECB's rate hike is not being fully transmitted to a key market, potentially weakening some of its effort to tighten policy, analysts said. - REUTERS

Opec+ does not explicitly state its preferred price level. Top officials in both Saudi Arabia and Russia have said in recent weeks that the group's policy focus is to ensure that global oil supply matches demand, not defend a certain price.

'Our focus is straightforward looking at supplies and demand balances over a period of no less than a year and most often a year and a half," a senior Opec+ source with knowledge of the matter told Reuters.

to Saudi Arabia for its price comfort zone. This year, Moscow has had to sell its crude at a discount to benchmark prices to buyers in Asia, because Europe and the United States have banned or discouraged Russian oil imports in retaliation for the war in Ukraine.

Russia wants oil at not less than \$100 to compensate for the discounts, two industry sources familiar with Russian thinking said. Deputy Prime Minister Alexander Novak rejected the idea that there was any price collusion.

We are not talking about price formation, but about the adequacy of supply on the market, so that on the one hand there is no excess, and on the other there is no shortage," Novak said this month.

Opec has made sporadic attempts to keep prices at a certain level in the past. In 2000, the group came up with a price band mechanism to keep oil between \$22 and \$28. When prices surged well above \$28 a few years later, the band was suspended.

Saudi Arabia and Opec have also favoured oil at \$100 at various times. Saudi Arabia first endorsed \$100 oil in 2012 and in 2018 Saudi officials were saying in private meetings that \$80 to \$100 oil was desirable, sources said at the time.

Such high aspirations took a backseat after developments including the U.S. shale oil boom and a resulting global oversupply and price collapse made them unrealistic, as did the price slide during the COVID pandemic.

Now, tight supply is support-ing prices again. Shale growth has dropped down Opec's list of concerns and forecasters still expect solid growth in oil demand in 2023 despite weaker economic growth and fears of recession. — REUTERS

Johnny Depp, Amber Heard's defamation trial to be adapted into a film

Johnny Depp and Amber Heard's highly-publicised defamation trial is being adapted into a film.

Titled Hot Take: The Depp/ Heard Trial, the film is set to debut on the free Tubi streaming service.

The film stars Mark Hapka (Parallels, Days of Our Lives) as Depp and Megan Davis (Alone in the Dark) as Heard, Variety reported.

Melissa Marty (Station 19) will join Hapka and Davis as Depp's lawyer Camille Vasquez and Mary Carrig (Law & Order True Crime) will portray as Heard's lawyer, Elaine Bredehoft.

Hot Take follows the tumultuous relationship of Depp and Heard, dramatising the two-month defamation trial that concluded June 1, with the jury finding that Heard had defamed Depp by alluding to domestic vihim in a December 2018 op-

Come Fall in Love-The DDLJ Musical raises eyebrows

Sadly for SRK fans, the lead role of Raj from *Dilwale Dulhania Le Jayenge* has been taken over by a white character in the stage adaptation of the iconic Bollywood movie

t is one of the most successful Bollywood movies of all time. Though released in 1995, it still plays daily at a movie theater in Mumbai, India. Its songs are a mainstay at weddings. Its lead actors became Bollywood superstars. And now *Dilwale Dulhania Le Jay*enge, or *DDLJ*, hashit the stage.

Come Fall in Love — *The DDLJ Musical* is in previews at the Old Globe before a planned Broadway run. Fans of the film had been abuzz after producers announced the stage adaptation last fall, but when the show's cast was revealed this summer, social media lit up with criticism. The news that a white actor, Austin Colby, would play the role of Rog — known as Raj in the film and played by Indian star Shah Rukh Khan — led many fans of the movie to accuse the show of whitewashing.

The show's creators say they want to tell the story of two cultures coming together. But those critical of the casting decision see a missed opportunity. Amid increasing demands for more inclusive hiring and storytelling in the entertainment industry, South Asians are still underrepresented onstage and on screen.

"Just when you think we are moving on wards and upwards we are right back to square one," Andy Kumar, an India-based performer known as VJ Andy, wrote in a tweet. "Why can't our stories be told as they are? Without a white wash??"

On Instagram, negative comments were sprinkled among the responses to Colby's excited post about his casting. "Haven't y'all colonized enough," one user wrote. Another commented: "It is embarrassing that as a white man you are willingly stealing opportunities from men of color. This isn't something to be proud of."

Chef and restaurateur Vikas Khanna, who was born in India and lives in New York, has also expressed his disapproval on social media. "They took away a star from us," Khanna said during a video call. "All these guys would have gone in for auditions and the parents would have been: 'My God, my boy is going to be Raj!"

"Doing this, you're making our kids feel less-than," he added. "Let's not move back. We've worked really hard to be on the stage."

stage." DDLJ was one of the first Indian films to center on a love story between nonresident Indians (known as NRIs), a reflection of the large numbers who were emigrating. It focuses on two young NRIs living in London. The party boy Raj (Khan) is rich, entitled and Western, quite the opposite of the old-fashioned Simran (Kajol) and her hardworking traditional father, who says to Raj in the film: "You call yourself an Indian? You give India a bad name." But when Simran returns to India for her arranged marriage, Raj and Simran try to persuade her father to let their love conquer all.

Beyond the central love story, the movie also resonates because of its focus on love of country and family.

The film "touched a nerve" with NRIs who were "navigating between two or three cultures," Rajinder Dudrah, a professor at the Birmingham Institute of Media and English, explained in an interview. Individuals were having to grapple with the tension between Indian tradition and Western ideas just as this movie was highlighting them. "The idea of 'dil hai Hindustani' the heart is Indian," was also conveyed in the film, Dudrah added, "meaning that no matter where in the world you were, if you were of Indian descent, you had an attachment to India."

Although the show includes nods to the film — pigeons, fields of mustard flowers, a mandolin cameo — and the film's narrative arc remains, this *DDLJ* is decidedly American. Raj has been transformed into Roger (or Rog), and the leads now live in Massachusetts, meeting as Harvard students in Cambridge. Aditya Chopra, who directed the movie, is also directing the stage show; the book and lyrics are by Nell Benjamin, who wrote the screen-to-stage adaptations of *Legally Blonde* and *Mean Girls*.

In August, Chopra posted a statement on Instagram saying that his original vision for the film involved a white male lead. (His first choice at the time was Tom Cruise.) "The most powerful way to depict a country's culture and values is to see it from the perspective of someone who does not belong to the same culture," Chopra wrote, saying his goal was to showcase Indian culture for a global audience. "That is the starting point of *Come Fall in Love*, the story of Indian Simran, her culture and heritage through the eves of American Roger."

This month. Benjamin said she was not

surprised by the reaction, "given the lack of representation" in the theater, but the uproar was still unsettling. "I was distressed that people thought that Adi or me or anyone would want to whitewash this movie," she said, referring to Chopra. "That would suggest that, 'Oh, well, when we do it, she's going to fall in love with this guy because he's better than the options.' That's not the story. I believe people who come to see the show will get that."

The show's writers stressed that the production still featured a predominantly South Asian cast, including Shoba Narayan, who plays Simran, and a production spokesperson said South Asians represented more than 50% of cast members.

Benjamin said the creators had considered writing the male lead as an Indian American or a half-Indian man but believed it would have been an "easy choice" that wouldn't have worked as well. "If you don't excavate it, you don't add value to it," she said, adding that Chopra "is perfectly capable of doing the exact movie as a musical, developing it in Mumbai and then renting a theater in New York, but that's not what we wanted to do together."


Not everyone was critical of the direction the stage musical has taken. Bollywood screenwriter Shibani Bathija (*My Name Is Khan, Fanaa*) saw the advantages in changing the lead's ethnicity to make the story work for a general audience. "I think having him be South Asian would be more problematic, because where is all this objection coming from," she said, referring to the family's disapproval of the central couple's relationship. The United States focuses less on caste and class differences than India or Britain, she said, so the possible



differences between two South Asians would not be as apparent to an American audience.

"If you hadn't watched the film, you wouldn't get it," she said. "There would need to be another level of explanation that maybe wouldn't serve the creative."

The show's composers, Vishal Dadlani and Shekhar Ravjiani, known as Vishal & Shekhar, also disagreed with the criticism. Ravjiani said they were proud to represent India through the musical, for which they created an 18-song score. (The two did not write the film's original songs, which have become classics, and only a few melodies from the movie are heard in the musical.) Dadlani said that Chopra wanted to tell this specific story and that it was "ridiculous" to say that "just because you're an Indian filmmaker, you should write the story differently."

"It's not about color, it's not about white or brown," Dadlani added. "It's about a boy who's in love with a girl and whose family is different than the girl's family."

However, Benjamin, interviewed

separately, thought of color as a storytelling tool. She explained that in her view, "with the change to Rog, you're talking about color" and discussed how Roger's "whiteness" gave him privilege, making things easy for him, until he faced Simran's father.

Despite the criticism of the show, among the three dozen or so audience members interviewed in San Diego, the response was mostly positive — from those familiar with the film and those who weren't.

One of the few dissenting voices was Shebani Patel, who flew in from San Francisco to see the show: "I was not pleased with the casting. I don't hate the show, but it's not our show."
